

How to Get Away with Nominalization: The Syntax of Deverbal Nouns

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Course description

The course aims at providing insight into the world of (nominalizing) affixes and deverbal nominalizations (i.e. nouns derived from verbs with suffixes such as *-ation*, *-ing*, *-ment*, *-ance/-ence*, etc., see (1) *examine* → *examination*).

- (1) a. The doctor's examination of the patients took an hour.
b. The examination is taking too long.
c. The examination is on the teacher's desk.

Starting from Grimshaw's (1990) classes of deverbal nominals, complex event nominalizations (CENs (1a)), simple event nominalizations (SENs (1b)) and result nominals (RNs (1c)) and examining a rich corpus of authentic English (and Romanian) examples, we will discover together the morpho-syntactic and interpretative properties that these 3 classes of deverbal nouns exhibit.

Prerequisites: Participants should be familiar with basic concepts of morphology and syntax.
